

# 2023 Challenges

- Natural gas prices. The cost of natural gas escalated world-wide in February 2023, exceeding the county's \$0.99 cap.
- Carbon Free Power Project. The proposed construction of a nuclear power production facility utilizing small modular reactors, was terminated due to the inability to obtain full subscribership.
- Traffic congestion. NMDOT's construction on the NM4 & E. Jemez Rd. intersection coupled with an increased number of LANL employees/commuters led to increased congestion.
- Affordable Housing. Housing inventory is low and not able to meet the growing demands. Mortgage rates and construction lending are at multi-decade highs making affordable housing a big challenge for 2024.

# 2023 Highlights

- "Oppenheimer" movie premiere. The movie premiered on July 20 at the SALA theater. With that we saw a flurry of media and tourism.
- Website launch. The new website launched in October 2023.
- Jemez Mountain Fire Protection. NM State legislature awarded \$7 million to be applied toward the Jemez Mountain Fire Protection project.
- Greenhouse gas study. A contract was finalized with a contractor to complete a greenhouse gas study which was recently completed.





















# **Quality Governance**

### **Communication & Engagement**

- Launched a new user-friendly website.
- Implemented new communication tools "Have Your Say" online public comments, more video for meetings & more surveys.
- Held town halls & public meetings to engage the community.
   E.g. CIP/2024 budget preparation, raising the minimum wage, short-term rental, redevelopment options for 20<sup>th</sup> Street parcels, wildlife/animal ordinance.










# **Quality Governance**

### **Intergovernmental & Regional Relations**

- Continued to strengthen relations w/San Ildefonso, LANL, DOE-EM, NNSA and contractors.
- Hosted an Energy Communities Alliance peer exchange.
- Identified local/regional projects for the Progress Through
   Partnering Program (e.g. County provided funding for LAPS to expand recreation & community spaces for the Pinion & Chamisa school replacement projects; reimbursed our Regional Strategic partner, Rio Arriba & Espanola, for capital projects.)
- Coordinated regional housing & transportation opportunitie.
   (Support housing in Espanola & expand transit hubs in the region.)
- Worked w/legislators, Governor's office and others. Received \$7
   million for the Jemez Mountain Fire Protection Project.

### **Fiscal Stewardship**

- The County's Finance Division received five awards from the Government Finance Officer's Association
  - √ Financial reporting,
  - ✓ Annual Budget,
  - ✓ ACFR,
  - ✓ PAFR, and
  - ✓ Triple Crown Honor.
- Total revenues were \$118.7 million in FY23 (\$33.2 million higher)
- Total expenses were \$73.7 million in FY 23 (\$7.6 million higher),






# Operational Excellence

### **Effective, Efficient, Reliable Services**

- DPU reduced its SAIDI to below 60 minutes. (This is the average amount of time a customer could expect to be without power in a 12-month period).
  - ✓ This is well below last year when the when the SAIDI peaked at 220 minutes in November 2022 as compared to 31 minutes in November 2023.
  - ✓ In 2022 the U.S. SAIDI was over 300 minutes, and the New Mexico SAIDI was approximately 180 minutes.
- DPU continues to repair and replace aging infrastructure and aggressively trim trees around power lines.

# Operational Excellence

### **Asset Management**

- CSD prioritized & budgeted asset maintenance projects in accordance with its Integrated Master Plan and ADA audit. Under renovation: 3 athletic fields, 2 courts, & 2 playgrounds.
- Public Works sought input from contractors to improve its solicitation process.
  - ✓ This resulted in an increased number of competitive responses for a road project in North Mesa.

### **Employee Recruitment & Retention**

- ✓ Hired 191 new employees and processed 92 promotions
- ✓ Implemented increases to compensation & benefits
- ✓ Established sign-on compensation for several departments
- ✓ Entered into limited negotiations with all active county unions.

### Housing

- 1022 units under construction and/or have a site plan approved.
  - **The Bluffs** (64 affordable multi-units for seniors) is preleasing.
  - The Hills (144 market-rate multi-family units) move in ability is anticipated for the second quarter.
  - Mirador (161 market-rate detached single family homes). Half of the development is completed and occupied. The mixed-use portion is on hold pending NMDOT approval for traffic lights at NM4 & Sherwood.
  - Canada Bonita (150 market-rate multi-family units). Approved & waiting development.
  - Arbolada (85 single family detached units). Approved & waiting development.
  - Mari Mac (332 apartments above mixed-use). Approved. Request for financial assistance from the developer expected in the first quarter.








### Housing

- Upcoming housing projects
  - 20th Street redevelopment. Solicitation for a mixed-use residential/commercial development.
  - A-8-A development. Solicitation for medium density single- and multifamily residential.
  - 36th & Trinity. Agreement in consideration for attached SF home development.
  - North Mesa workforce housing. LAPS Board & Council approved an MOA in Dec. for a comprehensive review & development plan for the middle school property.
- Affordable Housing Plan to be updated to include low- and moderate-income households. Finished Plan in 2024.

### **Local Businesses**

- Business licenses, total issued in 2023: 219
  - Los Alamos/White Rock: 115
  - Out-of-town businesses: 104
- **ARPA** 
  - 56 total applications received.
  - \$1.95 million issued to 35 businesses by 2023 year-end from the COVID-19 Financial Assistance, Technical Assistance & Deferred investment assistance programs. Funds continue to be issued in 2024.
- Janice Krish is our new Economic Development Program Manager.
  - Facilitate investment & growth for local businesses.
  - Participated in the Outdoor Economic Conference (Oct. 23-25). Brought the attendees to Los Alamos for a secret city bike tour.








### **Downtown Revitalization**

- Commercial building permits issued in 2023: **55**
- In 2023 CDD began identifying and developing tools to implement the Los Alamos Downtown Master Plan & White Rock Town Center Master Plan.
- MRA Designation:
  - White Rock Town Center was designated a Metropolitan Redevelopment Area in early 2023.
  - CDD will seek the same designation for the Los Alamos Downtown East in 2024.
  - An MRA designation allows us to utilize other financial tools to meet the objectives of the adopted Master Plans. E.g. expanded use of LEDA & the potential creation of tax incremental financing.











### **Tourism and Special Events**

- Project Oppenheimer: We partnered with the LACDC and the nonprofit community to educate, brainstorm and collaborate on a joint marketing effort to provide a consistent, unified visitor experience.
  - Project "Oppie" was nominated for a 2023 Top Hat award by the New Mexico Hospitality Association.
  - The Visitor Centers and the Los Alamos History Museum saw an influx of tourists.

### Special Events:

- ScienceFest, Bear Fest, Atomicon, Summer Concert Series, 4th of July Spectacular at Overlook, and more.
- Summer Concert Series in 2023: Billy Bob Thornton & Boxermasters headlined. Total attendance was ~89,000 for the 15 concerts (64% LA County residents & 36% outside of the county).








### **Community Broadband Network**

- Broadband network study was completed.
- Project procurement is in progress.
  - √ We reissued the request for proposal (RFP) in early December. All interested vendors have until January 12, 2024 to respond to Phase 2 of this 2-step "Design, Build, Operate" opportunity.
- Middle mile second fiber optic line is ongoing.
  - Ongoing discussions and coordinated meetings with the Pueblo of San Ildefonso.








### Health, Wellbeing, and Social Services

- Comprehensive Health Plan work continues.
  - Series of listening sessions were held in Nov. & Dec.
  - Comprehensive Plan anticipated in 2024.
- Fentanyl workshops; distributed lifesaving Narcan at no cost.
  - ✓ Information is on our website lacnm.com/Narcan (overdose signs, what to do, where to get Narcan).
- Led the Hawk Hangout monthly events for our tweens.
  - Collaborative effort and held at various community partner locations.
- Facilitated a Youth Summit
  - Opportunity to discuss concerns & challenges and provide resources.
- Aquatic Program grants
  - ✓ Personal grants to eligible customers for assistance & accommodations for aquatic programs.




### Diversity, Equity, and Inclusivity

- Continued organizational membership in the Government Alliance on Race and Equity.
- Created a staff working group to develop goals & research best practices.
- Offered staff training.
  - Transgender Cultural Fluency and Working with Pueblo Neighbors.
- Received feedback from LAPS on diversity, equity & inclusivity training.

### **Mobility**

- Initiated an update to the Transit Master Plan.
  - ✓ Potential transit center locations to support downtown revitalization.
- ✓ ADA improvements underway to County facilities & programs.
















### **Education, Historical, and Cultural Amenities**

- Evaluated & renewed the variety of literacy, arts & cultural program offered by our libraries (Atomicon, seed library, "Library of Things" collection, diverse programming for Pride month. Also celebrated Native American, Hispanic, African American and other cultural months).
- Partnered with LAPS for supplemental programming opportunities. (Middle School - Hawk Hangout, High School Key Club – Youth Summit)
- Promoted Fuller Lodge Historical District & expanded public access to the Manhattan Projection National Historical Park sites.
- Upgrade of the historical walking tour. New signs under review by neighboring Pueblo Tribes and the National Park Service.
- Discussions with the 2 other Manhattan Project national Historical Park sites and Friends of MAPR to enhance accessibility.















### **Open Space, Parks & Recreation**

- Deferred trail maintenance
  - Recruited volunteers; held eight clean events.
  - Initiated the Trail and Open Space Management Plan project.
- Deferred park maintenance.
  - Contracts underway BMX Design, WR Skate Park, playground, athletic fields and athletic courts renovation.
- Deferred recreation facilities maintenance.
  - Temporary chiller and a draft design for upper parking lot at the ice rink.
  - Golf course project.
  - Additional power sources for vendors at Ashley Pond.















### **Public Safety**

- Los Alamos Police Department
  - Updated the Hazard Mitigation Plan (w/FEMA for approval).
  - Updated the Emergency Operations Plan (under legal review).
- Los Alamos Fire Department
  - ✓ Negotiated a new 10-year cooperative agreement with DOE/NNSA.
  - ✓ LAFD staffing levels will increase significantly over the next 10 years to serve the growing needs of LANL.
  - ✓ LAFD is preparing for its sixth accreditation (continuous improvement process). If granted, it will be one of only 2 or 3 in the nation.
  - ✓ Updating fire stations. Working with DOE to replace two stations on DOE property with three. One station is currently under construction.
  - ✓ LAFD is replacing one County-owned fire station near the golf course.
  - ✓ Fire saved State Fire Funds for the last 3 years (~\$2 million) and received \$2 million from the Governor's Capital Outlay distribution.


### **Natural Resource Protection**

- Tree replacements at County parks & recreational facilities.
- Established an internal Tree Preservation and Mitigation policy.

### **Greenhouse Gas Reduction**

- The greenhouse gas study has been completed.
- Next, we will develop a Climate Action Plan for Los Alamos using data from the greenhouse gas study.
- This will allow us to introduce development codes and policy modifications to implement the Climate Action Plan.

### **Carbon Neutral Energy Supply**

- Carbon Free Power Project for nuclear energy was terminated due to lack of full subscribership.
- DPU continues to pursue other carbon free electrical energy resources.
  - ✓ Geothermal energy project with UAMPS in Nevada for 4 MW.
  - ✓ Solar-plus energy storage power purchase agreement with Foxtail Flats (170 MW of solar & 80 MW four-hour battery storage system).

### **Water Conservation**

- DPU to offer class 1A effluent (better quality reclaimed wastewater)
   to expand irrigation at parks & schools from the LA WWTP.
- DPU's conservation coordinator offered various energy & water conservation programs (participated in "Library of Things").





### **Waste Management**

- Environment Services continued to offer robust recycling, re-use, composting and waste reduction programs.
- Opened the Overlook Re-Use Center.
- Continued the Zero-waste campaign.
- Deployed 1000 bear-resistant residential carts to date (on-demand, rather than 100% deployment).
  - ✓ Staff is exploring other brands and manufacturers' products that may be more compatible with the Environmental Services' trash collecting vehicles.


